# His Eye Is On The Sparrow

This has never happened in our lifetimes! Due to the COVID19 virus outbreak, we are required by the state of Ohio to stay home except for a few things like getting food, going to the doctor, or going to work. Most of us are working from home if that is at all possible. Many have lost their jobs. The grocery stores ran out of toilet paper and other basic supplies. There are not enough protective masks and gloves for even healthcare workers in the hospitals. And in our churches, we made the decision to stop worship services and other meetings at the church and are doing them online instead. It is easy under these circumstances to be discouraged, lonely, and afraid. I find comfort in the words to the old gospel song; *His Eye is on the Sparrow*:

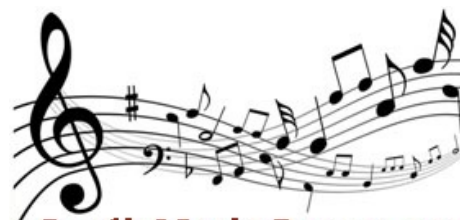

It is imperative that we collect every unit we can. Over 6,000 blood drives and 200,000 donations have been cancelled in the past week. A shortage of blood puts doctors in the position of having to choose which patient gets the lifesaving blood.

All donors are asked to enter through the lower patio door. Red Cross will check temperatures before donors and workers enter the building. Anyone with a temperature of 99.5 or over will not be allowed to enter.

**Enhanced Disinfecting** Lots of hand sanitizer from check-in until leaving.

**Social Distancing:** Will allow as much distance as possible between donors while waiting to give and while giving. We will not be serving sandwiches, veggie dips and homemade cookies at this drive.

There will be water and snacks to take with you.

# How To Video Conference with Zoom

This should be easy! (If it's not, I'll be happy to help!, Rev. Annie)

## How to Register with Zoom:

Step 1: Go to: Zoom.us

Step 2: Type your E-mail Address in the box next to the orange box that says "Sign-up for free."

Step 3: Go to your E-mail to find a message from Zoom

Step 4: Click the box (in the E-mail) that says "Activate Account."

Step 5: It should take you to the Zoom page that says "Welcome to Zoom"

Step 6: Type in your first and last name and create a password. Hit continue.

Step 7: Following this step it will prompt you to go to "Start my meeting." However, you will not need to do so because we will E-mail you the link when it's time to meet.

## It's time to meet, now what?

That was pretty easy, right? Now that you're registered with Zoom here's how we will gather.

- Before our meeting, I will give you a link.
- At the time of our designated meeting, you will simply click on the link.
- It may ask you, do you want to open "zoom.us?" Select Allow.
- Click "Join Audio Conference by Computer."
- You should now see yourself with the use of your camera. If not, look at the bottom of the screen and select "Start Video."
- If for any reason you can not see us, you may need to double check that your computer does have a camera.
- Likewise, you should notice that when talking the microphone should say "Mute" which means it's currently live and we can hear you.
- If for any reason you can not hear us, consider turning up the volume on your computer.

## As we gather, a few things to note about video conferencing:

1- We can hear and see you! Pick a space that will not have a lot of background noise. Let people in the house know you're going to be on a video call.

- 2- While we want to encourage conversation, I would suggest that everyone would simply keep their microphone off until you want to say something. This will help keep down the disruption of background noise and the loud breathing.
- 3- When you do want to say something, you might visually hold up your hand (as you would in school) just so that we see that you're trying to get in the conversation. There are many other ways to do this through the use of technology, but let's just start here.

## Zoom on the Smart Phone

If you're interested in using Zoom on your phone, simply download the blue "Zoom" App. Follow all the Zoom registration instructions, as stated above, and then using your phone open the link provided by whoever is hosting the meeting and it should take you directly to video conferencing on your phone. It's that simple!

## Zoom on Any Phone, Audio Only

Finally, you can also use a call in number to join in the meeting audio only. In the email from the host, you will see a phone number that you can dial into. You may need the phone number, meeting number and password that can be found in the host email.

The whole point of using Zoom is to make this more convenient for you. There could be a variety of reasons why your device may have challenges using Zoom and those may need to be addressed separately. Do yourself a favor, try it out before the meeting! Make sure your video and audio are working.

## ***Suggestions for Togetherness***

### ***7 Activities for Families***

Families with kids are having so much time TOGETHER! Here are some ideas of things to do that could help kids grow spiritually, and help you grow as a family of faith.

1. Read a Bible story, and then tell the story using Legos or other toys.
2. Take a prayer walk. As you walk, look for things you are thankful for, and look for evidence of people who need your prayer.

3. Write letters, emails, or texts to encourage others, especially people who live alone.
4. Draw a comic strip of a parable in the Bible (see Luke 7-18).
5. Read Psalm 23 and create a big mural about it.
6. Read Joshua 1:9 and then make up motions to it.
7. Make up a dance to a favorite hymn or spiritual song.

# One Hundred Years Ago Another Influenza Epidemic by Polly Horn

Spanish Flu started in 1918 and ran through 1920. Spain was a neutral country during WWI so their news was freely reported including an early case of the flu. However other countries including the United States are possibly the origin. On March 11, 1918 a soldier reported ill at breakfast time in Ft. Riley, KS. By noon 100 soldiers were ill; by evening 500. Soldiers were moved from base to base and overseas carrying the virus with them as the doughboys went to WWI. Estimates are that 1/3 of the world's population was infected and from 20 million to 50 million people were killed worldwide from this flu. I'm sure there are local statistics but I'd rather tell the story of a local family's experience.

William Horn (age 45) married Daisy Evans of Center Village. In 1919, they lived on a farm on the inside of the curve on Dent Road where it went toward Ross Road in Trenton Township. Their first baby died in 1901 just months before the second was born. Daisy (age 44) had just given birth to their 8<sup>th</sup> child, Edward, on March 8, 1919 and was still in her 'laying in' when the influenza struck her family. The oldest daughter Mary (age 17) who had helped deliver the baby, also helped William take care of the sick children: Jim (14), Burt (11), Pearl (9), Alvin (6), and Melvin (3). Just as the others were getting on their feet, Mary and her father became ill. Mary died on March 22 and her father William died 2 days later.

The family was already a poor farm family but without the father, things became much worse. Good neighbors answered notices in The Sunbury News that said 'Widder Horn' needs help planting, and 'Widder Horn' needs help harvesting. Obviously the neighbors kept the family going.

The children walked to Sinkey School at the corner of Ross and Dent Road. The boys only had one pair of shoes which they shared so only one boy went to school each day. As soon as they finished 8<sup>th</sup> grade they would drop out of school to get jobs on neighboring farms to help their mother. They made sure Melvin and Ed stayed in school and graduated from Sunbury High School.

When the odd jobs dried up, the older boys, Jim, Burt and Melvin got an old pick-up truck and followed crop harvesters across the states to earn money to send home. Melvin tired of harvesting crops and decided to join the Navy in October 1940 and was on U.S.S. Arizona when it was sunk in Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 (he was the first from Delaware County killed in WWII). The 2 older boys enlisted to get revenge on the enemy who killed their brother. Alvin was married and the father of 3 boys so he could not enlist. He went to California to make ships for the Navy. His family followed him. His middle son, Bob, got polio and was in an iron lung which brought memories of watching his father die to Alvin. Other than Melvin, after the war they all came home.
