## Presbytery Installs Minister



All Elders of the church lay hands on Pastor Sam and pray Reverend Samuel Monte was officially installed by the Presbytery of Scioto Valley, serving central and southern Ohio, on Sunday, November 19th at a special afternoon Installation Service. Installation services are conducted by each Presbytery and they encourage all members to participate so new pastoral colleagues within the Presbytery feel fully welcomed to that region. Pastor Sam, having started his ministry at Condit in September, is serving as the 45<sup>th</sup> minister of Condit Presbyterian Church since it was founded as First Trenton Presbyterian Church in 1836. A sizeable crowd attended his service and all were invited for a cake and punch reception following the installation. Reverend Kathy Nice, Pastor Malcom, Reverend Emily Corzine and Pastor Deb Bergman all participated in the installation service. Former GAP minister, Pastor Wayne Morrison, was also in attendance. Condit extends many thanks to the Presbytery for arranging this meaningful worship service and for all who made the trip to officially unite Pastor Sam to Condit Presbyterian Church and the Presbytery of Scioto Valley.

## Advent Study Group



# **Mary Kingseed**

Mary Kingseed was new to the area and knew no one when she stepped into Condit Presbyterian last spring but Sheila Micholes greeted her warmly and showed her around so that she felt welcomed immediately–a feeling amplified by the friendliness of the other church members she met that day.

Mary had moved from Galion to Greyland Estates off County Road 605 to live with her daughter and son-in-law, Lisa and Brad Reed, on an icy winter day at the end of January. The spacious house open to the morning sun has a special suite for Mary including kitchen and patio. She was so ready to be there she arrived a day ahead of family and furniture, spending the first night on the floor.

An Ohio native, Mary's family lived in Upper Arlington with stints in London, OH, and Missouri while her dad was in the Navy. They moved to Louisville, KY, when she was in second grade and then back to Upper Arlington when she was a sophomore. After graduation from Upper Arlington High School she was off to The Ohio State University to study child development, preschool and kindergarten.

As fate would have it, friends "fixed her up" a date with OSU agriculture student Al Kingseed. After her sophomore year, they married. Their first home was in one of the brick residences, mostly inhabited by college students (and cockroaches, Mary would say) on King Avenue. Rent was only \$90 a month but gas heat from a "big old" converted coal furnace was \$100. She remembers how proud she was to have cooked her first Thanksgiving turkey but where was the dressing, Al asked, and the giblets? Oops, still in the bag. Still in the turkey.

Lisa was born the next year and soon they moved to their first house on Woodstock Road. Brent came next and Mark completed the family after they



moved to Galion. Mary's father and brother were working at American Steel Grave Vault Co. in Galion, a company started by her grandfather. When her brother, Bill, joined the U.S. Air Force they asked Al to join the company.

The last time Mary saw Bill he was home from Vietnam for a few weeks before going back for his second tour and proud of receiving his captain's wings. Two weeks later the family was notified Capt. William (Bill) Unckrich flying a C-123 cargo plane had given his life for his country Oct. 10, 1969.

During the years her children were in school Mary was an elementary school librarian, helped with reading and at the middle school library. She was secretary for the family vault company, for Community Counseling Services in Bucyrus, for Fairview Cemetery in Galion and activities director for a local nursing home.

The Kingseeds, along with other families and friends, enjoyed snowmobiling in Michigan in the winter. She says she nearly froze to death but she told herself she could do it and she did. When she was 60

The quarterly Faith Filled Women meeting was held November 10<sup>th</sup> at The Bridge. As women of Condit were responsible for providing the program, Marianne Westbrook invited Cornerstone of Hope to share about their 5013c nonprofit organization. Matt Grant, Donor Relations Officer, spoke briefly about Cornerstone of Hope and then introduced Jen Bechtel, Assistant Coordinator from Cornerstone's fellow program, Mid-Ohio Traumatic Loss Response Team, to speak about their work in Delaware, Morrow, Marion, and Crawford counties.

Cornerstone of Hope is a comprehensive bereavement center located in Westerville. It operates with the philosophy that no one should grieve alone and offers grief counseling, support groups, memorial events and spiritual care for adults, youth, couples/families, as well as group and community response programs. The goal is to help others manage grief and come out with a renewed sense of purpose, thus the slogan "Grief with Hope."

In 2022 Cornerstone of Hope founded the Mid-Ohio Traumatic Loss Response Team, which offers free postvention support for suicide and overdose loss survivors. They offer 10 week support groups led by professionally trained facilitators and connect recent traumatic loss survivors with past survivors for emotional support. Mid-Ohio is currently seeking volunteers to help in this field with the hopes of offering Grief Share and Companionship Programs in all four of the above listed counties.

Condit's own Marianne Westbrook has recently completed training with the Mid-Ohio Traumatic Loss Response Team and is currently volunteering with them. If you are interested in joining the team as a volunteer please contact Marianne for guidance.

Lunch was offered after the meeting with a time for fellowship and discussion. The next meeting will be

March 8, 2024, at the Olive Green Church of Christ at 11 am. All women of any denomination are welcome to participate and bring a friend.

## **Treasurer's Report**

October 2023 Financials Submitted by Ken Bartlett

Our regular offering is approximately 74% of its ten-month budget amount (\$79,544.00 of \$107,301.02; \$27,757.02 in arrears). Total receipts are \$98,768.68 of the ten-month budget amount of \$127,371.85, \$28,603.17 in arrears.

Insurance, real estate taxes, and per capita are fully paid for the year. As the budget was prepared as though a full-time pastor was in place for the entire year, the net savings year-to-date for our pastoral leadership is \$44,115.48 through October. Total expenses were \$76,615.78 against a ten-month budget of \$127,371.85, resulting in outflows less than budget by \$50,756.07.

October net is **\$1,289.82** in the black, and the year-to-date net is **\$22,152.90** in the black after nine months.

Receipts are **\$14,533.27** more than a year ago, while expenses are **\$16,469.28** less than a year ago. This results in the net being **\$31,002.55** better than a year ago. This is mainly attributable to our previous pastoral situation.

Investments as a whole were down in October and are now up 1.5% year-to-date. Investments total \$230,280.69. Total funds available are \$271,545.98 as of the end of October, \$21,140.02 higher than the beginning of the year.

The equity market returns have been fueled by the Magnificent 7 stocks (MAMA ANT acronym – Microsoft, Amazon, Meta, Apple, Alphabet, Nvidia and Tesla), while dividend stocks have been out-of-favor. The 2023 new investments were split between safer short-term bond funds and higher dividend-paying funds, so we have not received those MAMA ANT returns.

The trustees are on to the next project – trying to figure out and resolve the basement flooding issue. Enrollment with the Board of Pensions has been completed and the catch-up billing occurred at the beginning of November.

a neighbor invited her to try community theater. She found acting "a lot of fun. You can be a completely different character than who you are," she says.

For many years Al and his buddies cooked roast beef in a pit for the annual Pickle Run Festival on Labor Day Weekend. Mary helped at the food stand. After they sold the grave vault company in 2004 they worked at Phil's deli, hosting a Friday cookout in front of the store May through October.

Mary and Al had sold their house and bought a Fifth Wheel. Foxfire Campground in nearby Nevada was their home base but in winters they headed to Texas campgrounds where they worked as activity directors, at one point providing 35 activities and weekend entertainment for 400 campers. Eventually they traded the camping lifestyle for a Galion condo but Mary says she still misses camping where "you meet so many nice people."


Al passed in 2018 after a six-year battle with lung cancer and later Parkinson's disease. When Lisa and Brad began to plan their "dream home," Mary planned with them. When her condo sold sooner than expected she lived first with her son and then her longtime neighbor asked her to come stay with her. This friend, whose health was declining, asked Mary if she would take Minnie her Chihuahua should she die. Already fond of Minnie, Mary agreed and enjoys the daily walks around her new neighborhood with her little companion.

Condit's newest member, Mary has not hesitated to get involved--in the choir, Women's Circle, the exercise class and now the new bell choir, something she's never done before. Music Director Adam Garner told her to just watch him. When he points, she rings her bell.

Grandmother to six, Mary was looking forward to her whole family being together for Thanksgiving and maybe for Christmas. Also, she says, she feels "so blessed to have found a loving caring family at Condit and looks forward to sharing Christ's love to all."
